
Sharing Values and Friendship

Sister Joyce Wagner grew up with three sisters and one brother in metropolitan Chicago. She developed a strong faith life thanks to her parents' influence, and recalls how she would attend services at St. Priscilla Church with her mother. Her memories of the "Tre Ore" services on Good Friday from 12:00-3:00 p.m. are especially vivid.

"My mother would sometimes bring baked treats to the Rochester Franciscan sisters who taught at St. Priscilla School," Sister Joyce recalled. "I loved to stay late after school to help the sisters. I was curious about their life and wanted to know what 'made them tick'."

Her first contact with the School Sisters of St. Francis came when she attended Alvernia High School. "I was instantly attracted to their simplicity and their congenial, friendly manner," she said. "So, after graduating from high school, I wasted no time preparing to enter the School Sisters of St. Francis. Though I originally wanted to be a physical education teacher, that option wasn't available to me at Alverno College, so I majored in elementary education."



"Following that, I began a new ministry serving in the Finance Office for our congregation's U.S. Province, where I served for 13 years," she said.

"I feel very blessed to be a religious sister today because of the presence of so many sisters who are content and happy with the years we've shared in community, the values we share in common, and the concern each one has for one another," Sister Joyce said. "One Sunday, when my mother was visiting, she observed our family spirit and noticed how eagerly the sisters share with one another. She commented to me, 'You really made a good choice here.""

Sister Joyce concurs. "I would encourage anyone who may be considering religious life today to discern this lifestyle very carefully. Anyone who shares our values, wants to be of service to others, and is interested in sharing life with a community of educated and deeply spiritual women should take the time to pause and consider this choice very prayerfully."

As she reflected on her life, Sister Joyce expressed deep gratitude for how gently God has cared for her through the years. Throughout her life, she had a favorite mantra that helped her through the hard times: "Be with me, Lord, when I am in trouble. Be with me Lord, I pray."
