


Ten Years of Having a Heart for Hunger

For the past decade, the School Sisters of St. Francis have organized the Joseph Bowls fundraiser around the time of the feast of St. Joseph, our congregation's patron saint. Originally held along with a Mass and soup supper, the event has evolved through the pandemic years, but has always featured beautiful, hand-painted bowls that also serve to remind us that hunger is a daily reality for 800 million people around the world.

The effects of COVID-19 have made food insecurity even more devastating, with health challenges, sharply increasing food prices, and a lack of employment opportunities in developing countries contributing to the crisis. Thanks to the generosity of our Joseph Bowls participants and donors, nearly \$100,000 in proceeds have been raised to benefit those who struggle with hunger.

This year's event was held March 26 at Alverno College, with both in-person and curbside participation options. Funds raised were designated to assist:

- Casa Alexia, our food program on the El Paso-Juárez border. This partnership of sisters from Latin America and the United States provides nutritious food for more than 100 families each month who face hunger, poverty, and violence every day.
- **Sisters Program South**, which provides a public health-based approach to help Milwaukee survivors of the street-based sex trade and human trafficking to live safer, healthier lives. Our U.S. Province is a founding partner in this collaborative project.
- Our sisters' hunger ministries in India.

 Many of the women, children, and men with whom our sisters minister in India suffer from extreme poverty and food insecurity. Oftentimes our sisters provide for these people out of their own food supplies.

Participants in our tenth-anniversary Joseph Bowls received a one-of-a-kind, hand-painted decorative bowl, lovingly crafted by our many partners and friends; a soup bowl cozy hand-quilted by Sister Joyce Ann Panos; souvenir recipe cards of two of our sisters' favorite soups to try at home; and information about the ministries that each donation supports.

Our sisters see the faces of hunger around the world and respond in service every day. The Joseph Bowls fundraiser enables our sisters to minister with the real people behind the statistics—the women, children, and families who have nowhere else to turn – thanks to the generous support of hundreds of our donors and friends of our community.



A Pathway to a Better Life

Women who are survivors of sex trafficking often have experienced years of victimization, exploitation, and criminalization, as well as poverty and racism. In Milwaukee, our U.S. Province's founding partnership in the Sisters Program South collaborative, administered by the Benedict Center, is making a profound impact that is changing these women's lives.

Jeanne Geraci, executive director of the Benedict Center, said that the women's traumatic experiences make them reluctant to seek out services. "Respite services are an essential, low-barrier entry point and an opportunity to build women's trust, confidence, and hope that a helping hand is available."

Founded in 2016, Sisters Program South continues to expand its reach and impact. From July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022, the program served 105 women (unduplicated) at its south side Sisters Drop-In Center, and reached 209 women through street outreach (715 contacts). These are both increases in the numbers of women served in 2020-2021.

Financial support from the School Sisters of St. Francis was used to strengthen street outreach and respite services provided at its peaceful, gardenlined center, Geraci said. "Funds were also used to purchase food for meals distributed through

street outreach and at the center; expenses for the program's van, which is used to transport women to and from the center; and to provide bus tickets to program clients. "

Melinda Hughes, Benedict Center's director of programs and operations, said support from our U.S. Province was also critical to receiving foundation grant funds that will help clients who have progressed in their healing to reach higher self-sufficiency goals around education, job training, and employment.

Hughes shared the success story of "Cherice," a 28-year-old woman who had been homeless for several years. After multiple contacts with Sisters Program South's outreach supervisor, she began visiting the Drop-In Center for meals, clean clothes, and showers, then began working with a case manager. With extensive help from her program advocate, Cherice recently was approved for independent housing and continues to work on addressing her other needs.

"The commitment of your donors and volunteers is directly responsible for the success Sisters Program South has achieved," Geraci said. "Your ministry has given thousands of vulnerable women in Milwaukee hope that there is a pathway to a better life."



The Miracle of Connection

As a toddler who could not hear, Spandhana was unable to decipher her parents' words, or share her feelings and needs. She grew increasingly withdrawn and prone to tantrums. Spandhana's parents were heartbroken. They feared that without some sort of miracle, her life would be one of isolation and dependency.

India is home to an estimated 63 million hearingimpaired people. With too few schools scattered across the subcontinent, most hearing-impaired children remain at home and don't learn to read or gain vocational skills. "When hearing-impaired girls do not go to school, they face lots of struggles and humiliation from society," said Sister Treesa Jose Thressokaran. "They will never be selfsufficient or self-reliant."

Impoverished families like Spandhana's cannot pay the tuition, room and board required to send a child hundreds of miles to a specialty school. That is why the School Sisters of St. Francis opened Assisi Nilaya, a hostel in Mysore for girls who attend a nearby school for hearing-impaired students. Four sisters minister with 36 girls ages 5 to 17 at the hostel, which is free of charge. Through the sisters' loving and expert care, the girls begin to bloom. When recent graduates Lakshmi and Anu arrived,

they could neither speak nor hear, and they had trouble adjusting to the hostel and school. Their academic performance was not good.

"We appointed Sister Kathlyn, a special education teacher, to work with them," Sister Treesa Jose said. "We motivated them and helped them in their studies. Today they work as accountants. They are both married and living very happily."

Spandhana's transformation has begun, as well. Now five years old, she has gone from silent to chatty, using lip reading and sign language. "She misses her mom and dad, but she loves the sisters and her companions here," Sister Treesa Jose said.

One day, like Lakshmi and Anu, Spandhana can have a job and an adult life of connection and joy. These girls and young women are living examples of the miracle of connection – a miracle that begins with your generosity. It helps them receive the education they need in order to learn voraciously and joyfully.

"Our donors are a great blessing to this ministry," Sister Treesa Jose said. "We still have miles to go, and we are so grateful you are with us on this journey."
